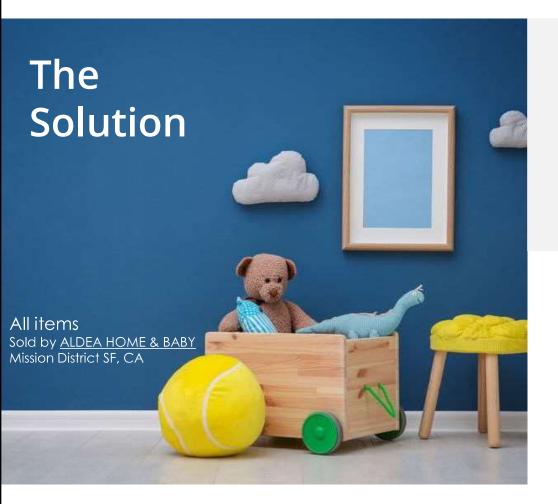
A lack of know-how or budget to invest in marketing technologies or campaigns

## eComm Platform For Local retail

Scalable, unified platform to sell goods online, grouped by geography (emulate Amazon's platform)



### Managed Services

Shared/Centralized functions (photography, marketing) performed by city-launchers (emulate Instacart's GTM)



## Power of the Collective

Consolidate disparate sellers into one-stop shop for consumers to find variety of goods (emulate Etsy's marketplace)



### Leverage Gig Economy

Gig workers will be used for whiteglove delivery and concierge services (ie returns, try-ons) (emulate DoorDash's delivery) Competitive Landscape

There's something special about small businesses; the owners are neighbors who are passionate about the products they sell and the community they serve

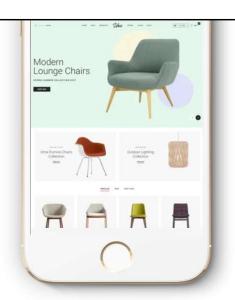


#### Hassle-free returns

# Sizing The Retail Market



Total US digital retail commerce was \$108B in the second quarter alone of 2020

In 2018 the overall revenue from retail sales in the US was \$6 trillion

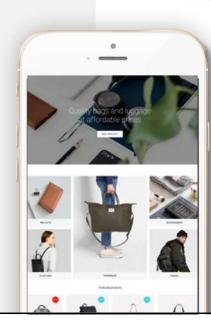
Retail spending globally is expected to be \$20 trillion by 2023

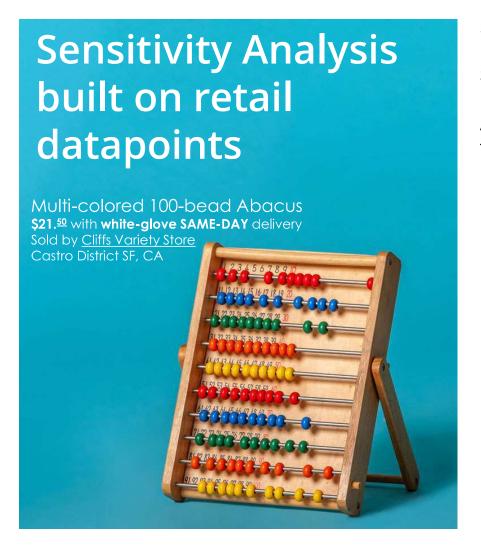
52% of consumers say that half or more of their purchases are influenced by convenience

4.7 million mom-and-pop small businesses in the U.S

Only about 28% of small businesses sell online

3.4mil addressable market (retailers not currently with e-comm)

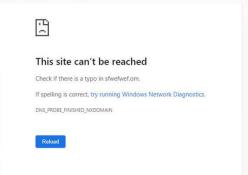
\$372k yearly avg revenue per small retailer in the U.S

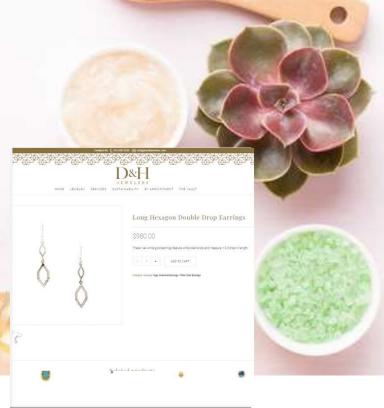
# No web presence

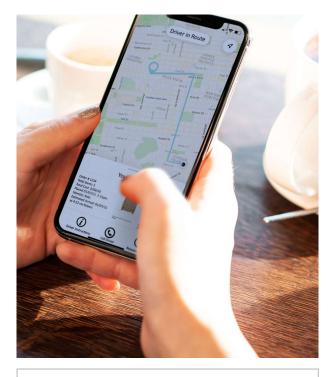
